It has been challenging for me to write an article this month. Yes, my schedule has been incredibly hectic, but there was something that prevented me from sitting down in front of a computer and actually start typing. At first, I had difficulty naming the reason for this but after reflecting for a while, I concluded that much of my inability to pen this piece is due to my own angst over the unknown future of my beloved denomination. As the year 2020 fast approaches with another General Conference scheduled and the implementation of 2019 General Conference legislations to take an effect starting January, I have to say that I am already feeling weary and jaded. Having conversations with my colleagues and some church members, I know that many share the feelings of anxiety and even nervousness.

So yes, one of the hottest topics in the mainline church world now is probably the future of the United Methodist Church: Is the denomination heading for schism? If you have been keeping up with Centenary Chimes this year, many of my articles have been about February's Special General

Conference and its aftermath. Without a doubt, what's been looming in my mind is whether our denomination will be getting a divorce, mainly over the church policies regarding LGBTQIA persons. Just like any divorce in a marriage, schism in church is not a simple matter as termination of relationships are concerned. There are varix church policies regarding LGBTQIA persons. There are various factors that need to be carefully and thoughtfully weighed, and honestly, it's not going to be easy for anyone who's involved.

Superficially, it appears that there are two major political powers in the United Methodist Church: The Traditionalists and the Progressives. These two can't stand each other, ready to split any minute. However, what many people don't realize is that not only are there the Traditionalists and the Progressives in the UMC, there is also a third party, the Centrists, the people in the middle. I've seen some data that it is the Centrists that really make up the majority of the United Methodists in the United States, and that the far-right and the far-left are but a smaller number compared to those in the middle. I'm uncertain whether those data come from an official United Methodist source, but regardless, I know that the Centrists very much exist.

In fact, a couple of months ago, in response to the Special General Conference and being united in their efforts to fight against the institutional discrimination, some key leaders of both the Centrist and Progressive movements got together in Kansas at the Church of the Resurrection (UMC's largest congregation in the

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Peace with Justice Sunday by Carolyn Tokunaga

On Peace with Justice Sunday, worship was led by the Church & Society Committee . They shared their thoughts, experiences, and visions.

"Seek justice, encourage the oppressed, defend the cause of the fatherless, plead the case of the widow" were the words of Isaiah. All humans are equal before God and have the right to be treated with dignity and fairness whoever they are. We are called through Jesus to live a selfless way of life, to treat others as the image of God and to advocate for those who can't speak for themselves.

When Kris and Stephanie Leese first came to Centenary 11 years ago, they were welcomed with open arms and felt the love of the congregation as they integrated into church life. Kris learned to wash rice, even though he didn't know it needed washing since for him, it came out of a box; and he and Stephanie are now carrying out the tradition of Centenary's teriyaki chicken. He wants this full inclusion for everyone else.

We are called to treat everyone as neighbors and for us, neighbors are the homeless population that lives on Skid Row, a mission for Kris. Through Centenary, he was exposed to different religions like Buddhism and its cultural connections. Attending Vigilant Love's Little Tokyo vigil after the Christ Church shootings and the Iftar dinner that ended the fast of Ramadan was eye-opening. As Kris joined the people fighting Islamophobia, he found more similarities than differences. He sees a need for more people to be involved. A Reconciling Church is open and accepting of the LGBTQ community. The committee is looking at steps for inclusion of this group – open and declared. Aiko's Team has been a part of his Centenary experience as it raises awareness of mental health and suicide. After this tragic event, Centenary came together to help others and today they carry the banner as team captains – to Enrich, Empower, and Impact.

Heidi Sasaki was taught by Centenary that as a Christian, it is her job to seek social justice and help vulnerable people. Asian Camp, mission trips, workshop and discussions gave her the tools and exposure to move outside her comfort zone, to make other peoples problems her problems – to fight for social justice. Centenary taught her a radical way of life and gave her the strength to connect with others to fight with and for them. Involvement with Church & Society has given her a way to work on Social Justice issues: Fair Trade education and the selling of fair trade coffee helps small farmers, 165 KIVA loans of \$25 have helped small business worldwide get started, Nikkei Progressives advocate for immigrants, Going Green helps our environment, Didi Hirsch educates and creates awareness, Kid City develops teen and young adult leaders, Vigilant Love combats Islamophobia and builds bridges between cultures and religions, the Reconciling Church fully supports the LBGTQ community.

Gloria O'Brien stated that she is a doer not a speaker. She did speak about peace and shalom. Shalom is not just a greeting but a word to describe socially just relationships. This peace sees the end of oppression, greed, and violence. It is visible and active. As Micah said, "And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God."

world) to consider what is next for the denomination. This gathering was called UMCNext and brought an impressive number of more than 600 United Methodists with groups of 10 from each Annual Conference in the United States.

I believe the representatives gathered for the event could not reach a consensus yet as to what needs to be done, and I don't blame them. After all, the UMC is so diverse and it is challenging to come up with a solution that is comprehensive and satisfactory for most people. There are those of us who want to sever ties immediately and create a new church, while there are those of us who want to stay together as one church, trying to make the changes within the system. Although, there were no concrete "next steps" laid out by the participants, they did put together four key commitments, which I saw as a glimmer of hope for our church.

Four Commitments of UMCNext

We believe these commitments are essential to a hope-filled future for the global Methodist movement as we make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world:

- 1. We long to be passionate followers of Jesus Christ, committed to a Wesleyan vision of Christianity, anchored in scripture and informed by tradition, experience and reason as we live a life of personal piety and social holiness.
- 2. We commit to resist evil, injustice and oppression in all forms and toward all people and build a church which affirms the full participation of all ages, nations, races, classes, cultures, gender identities, sexual orientations, and abilities.
- 3. We reject the Traditional Plan approved at General Conference 2019 as inconsistent with the gospel of Jesus Christ and will resist its implementation.
- 4. We will work to eliminate discriminatory language and the restrictions and penalties in the Discipline regarding LGBTQ persons. We affirm the sacred worth of LGBTQ persons, celebrate their gifts, and commit to being in ministry together.

I know that the United Methodist Church has a long and arduous road ahead, but with groups like UMCNext prayerfully leading the way, perhaps we have a more encouraging future to look forward to. My heart is still quite heavy as I anticipate what's to come, but I'm going to continue to put my trust in God, who is steadfast and faithful. Let's hold our denomination in ceaseless prayer.

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
